We need to take this into consideration when donating food to the food bank or making up Thanksgiving & Christmas baskets to give away.


So, I spoke to people getting food at a food bank and here are some things I learned from those in need:


HEALTH & WELLNESS- Meg America (megusa9988@gmail.com)

Mammograms

When should they start? According to the May 2023 recommendation of the U.S. Preventative Services Task Force. mammograms should begin at age 40. Women with a higher-than-average risk such as family history or known genetic mutation are generally urged to start earlier.

When should they stop? The new guidelines do not include recommendations for women after the age of 74. Medicare will continue to pay for a yearly screening mammogram with no age cut off. It is up to each woman to discuss their personal health situation with a trusted health care provider and make a decision.

Elder Abuse falls under GFWC Special Program. Abuse of elders or seniors takes many different forms with some involving neglect, some involves financial deception, and other

involving intimidation or threats against the senior.

Emotional or Psychological Abuse: This kind of abuse happens when people speak to or treat elderly people in ways that result in emotional pain or distress for the Senior.

As seniors grow older, they will become more physically and mentally frail. Because of this, they're less able to stand up to bullying and/or fight back if attacked by other people. Many people with ill intentions know this, and thus, have carried out abuse or elaborate fraud schemes targeting seniors.

Verbal forms of emotional elder abuse can take the form of intimidation through yelling or threats, humiliation and ridicule or habitual blaming or scapegoating.

Nonverbal psychological elder abuse includes ignoring the Aenior, isolating the Senior from friends or activities or terrorizing or menacing the Senior.

Keep in touch with your family and friends.


